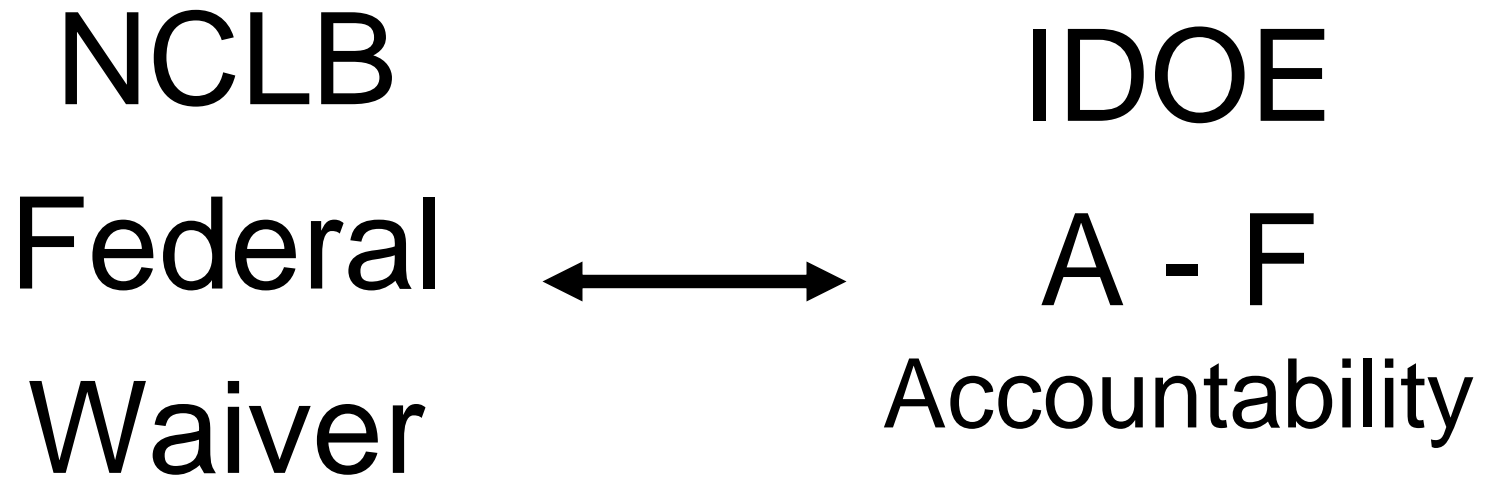



Impact of Waiver

- A – F grades (2012)
- Removal of grade capping
- AYP designation removed
- Report Cards
- Priority/focus Title I
- Every school will have a designated bottom 25% and a top 75%
- High School measurements will include Advanced Placement (AP), Dual Credit and Industry sponsored certifications
- Increased weight on passing rate as opposed to growth previously

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A-F Accountability

IDOE Definition:

The A-F Accountability model is designed to raise the bar for school accountability to drive student academic success. Indiana's new A-F Accountability model holds schools to higher standards and provides a more accurate picture of school performance by incorporating student academic growth, graduation rates, as well as college and career readiness variables as measures of school success

Indiana's Three Goals

90 – 25 – 90 Plan

1. 90% of students pass Math and E/LA ISTEP+
2. 25% of graduates pass an AP or International Baccalaureate (IB) exam or earn college credit during high school
3. 90% of students graduate with a diploma

Which Schools are Assessed?

- Public schools (traditional and charter)
- Accredited non-public schools
- Schools that participate in the voucher program

2015 Expectations

- Every school will receive an “A” or improve one letter grade
- Bottom 25%
 - Eng/Math improve to 60% passing
- Top 75%
 - Eng/Math improve to 92% passing
- Graduation rate improve to 90%
- Dropout rate reduced to 3%
- 25% of graduates pass an AP or IB exam or earn college credit during high school

2020 Expectations

- Every school will receive an “A” or improve by two letter grades
- Bottom 25%
 - Eng/Math improve to 75% passing
- Top 75%
 - Eng/Math improve to 94% passing
- 90% passing state assessments

Calculating English/Language Arts and Math Grades

- Performance
- Growth
- Participation

Determine a Final Grade

- Add the E/LA grade and Math grade and divide by two

New High School “A-F Model”

Overview of Performance and Improvement

- Calculate English 10 and Algebra I ECA Scores
- Calculate a Graduation Rate Score
- Calculate a College and Career Readiness Score
